#1 tip: set simple and clear expectations for all participants including parents




How are you supporting students?


Synchronous vs. Asynchronous: How are you using your time? Everything done in a sync class can be done in an async setting

- What fits best: Direct instruction, practice, remediation/intervention, social time or all of the above?
 - Tip: mix it up to ensure authentic learning is happening just like you would in a classroom
- Functional availability of students?
- Support teachers: pushing in or pulling out? Co-teaching?
- What do you want to assess and how do you want to set it up?
 - Tip: mix up assessment modes just like in the classroom
 - PBL, exit tickets, videos (Flipgrid!), teacher data grabs, etc.





- Plan time to teach classroom management & tools
 - If doing blended in or person learning, practice remote learning in class and plan for visuals and routines to transfer as well
- Build time into your day for parent connections & follow up
- Build extra time into your day for individual student follow up
- Build in weekly check ins with staff members for shared students
- Teacher schedules should NOT be mirror images of what they have with face to face students. Leave time for more administrative tasks and lesson creation.

Create a video bank for parents to view - make it easy to find

- How to's (submitting assignments, getting to live sessions, etc.)
- Class schedule
- Contact information

Example weekly plan/lesson plan list

- send to parents every Friday for the following week
- Transparency builds partnership
- Include needed materials and class times
- Assignments due on Friday with weekend as backup for families that need it

Email tips/tricks/templates

- The schedule should be 5 days, not a 6-day rotation
- Set a consistent schedule so families learn the routine

 Plan to keep 1-2 students after each live session to connect individually and gather progress monitoring

Maybe adjust the availability schedule for working parents 1-2 days a week

Set aside time to follow up with parents via phone and lan fun sessions too - not just all academic.

How Do You Connect with Virtual Students?

Use your webcam!

As much as you can - get on the webcam and get your kiddos on there, too!

If you are "known" for something in your brick and mortar classroom, then embody that in your online classroom!

Identify and connect with your kids EARLY and the learning will flow.



Let your personality and passions shine through!

You can still wear that TEACHER hat! (Literally!) Or whatever else you do!

You can still use the webcam to SHOW things! Math, art, pictures, pets!






One of my most favorite apps - PADLET!

- BE HUMAN you are not perfect and you do not have to be making it relevant and meaningful is the key.
- Ensure a connection of some kind other than just email go with Zoom and schedule class sessions if you can't be face to face physically, you CAN be on video!
- BE YOURSELF whatever your "mojo" is in the physical classroom, find a way to transfer that to the online one! Be approachable.
- It's ok to be vulnerable and not know everything about your "new" tools! Be reasonable with yourself don't be too critical.
- DO NOT bite off more than you can chew start slow get the basics down build from there. You just need to be ready for
 one week at a time! You do not have to be Pinterest-worthy from the beginning!
- Other tips for your online sessions to consider having a little script so you don't get "stage fright," have your lesson "plan" and any sites/documents open, manipulatives, etc have them handy.
- Consider recording your sessions and using this as an opportunity to be flexible and reach learners in a variety of ways.


 Recorded sessions can be an indispensable resource! (you can even embed a CODE WORD into them!)
- Even though you are holding class from home think about your background, your surroundings and distractions in your home.

 Also just think about your lighting. If you sit in front of a window, that will look super odd on the webcam!
- Have a space set up to teach...you cannot keep doing this just from your couch only. You need your "stuff" handy!
- Have your things open and ready to share like run through it in your mind.
- Be clear. Be concise. Be open. Be patient. Think outside of the box!
- Most of all have fun!!! Enjoy this learning experience! You might even find a few things to KEEP in your teaching practice
 moving forward! If you build connections with your students, the learning will come! CONNECT FIRST!!!!

Design your lessons to make students own the learning.

Got VOCAB?

Divide the vocabulary into several groups. Each group defines and provides a visual/example of their word(s) to present to the class. This can be done in 1-2 class periods.

Longer Group Presentations

Divide your unit into sections. Each group is assigned a different section to research and present to the class. As the groups present, you can add in your two cents and other activities. You and your students are teaching the

Assign long term individual projects where students create a product based on what they have learned.


Spend a week having students share their final products. This is a great way to fit in a unit that you just cannot squeeze in.



Assessment in the Virtual High School

Design assessments knowing that students have full access to the internet via computer, phone, other devices.

Make peace with this fact. Then begin your assessment design.



Assessments should focus on DOK 3 and DOK 4.

Place less emphasis and weight on assessments utilizing DOK 1 and DOK 2.

Free Tools for effective group work and PBL

Google Docs - Create a group document, Work on an assignment together.

Google Slides - Create a group presentation

Google Sheets - Make graphs, Organize data

Google Sites - Students can create a website to demonstrate mastery of content.

Wix - Students can create a website to demonstrate mastery of content.

Kahoot - You or the students/groups create a game. It's fun when the students make the game and you play against the students. The students all band together to try to beat you.

ScreenCast-o-Matic - Create instructional and feedback videos for your students. Students create videos to communicate questions and concerns with you.
